# **State Officials Visit Museum**

### Update on progress and future plans

In an effort to secure funding from the State of Ohio through the Cultural Facilities Commission, the Fire Museum invited all of the area State Senators and State Representatives to a May 22nd informational luncheon at the Fire Museum. We were very pleased to have so many of our area representatives accept the invitation to join us. We gave all the attendees a tour of the building and a packet with information about the Museum's future capital needs.

After the luncheon, Cleveland Division of Fire Chief Angelo Calvillo spoke to the group about the importance of the Fire Museum to the community. He was followed by Chief Patrick Sweeney of Shaker Heights, current president of the Cuyahoga County Fire Chiefs Association, and Ashtabula County's Rome Township Fire Chief Ed Koziol, current vice-president of the Northeast Ohio Fire Chiefs. They both reinforced the importance of the Fire Museum and its mission. The Museum provided a brief presentation to explain the Museum's mission and show why the funds were so badly needed and concluded by showing our DVD video which we have used in payroll deduction presentations.

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## Honoring the Only Cleveland Fire Fighter to Give His Life in **World War II**

Frank D. Centanni joined the Fire Department on August 1, 1939 and was assigned to Engine 28 at Station 28. His brother Leonard took the entrance test at the same time as They sat together Frank. during the test and had identical scores. Civil Service accused them of cheating and required them to take the test again...in separate rooms. They did and both had identical scores, again. Leonard was not appointed until September 16, 1946 after serving in the Army and he also was assigned to Engine 28.

Frank left the Department on a leave of absence on May 31, 1941 to join the Army. He was chosen for Office Candidate's School and graduated as a Second Lieutenant. He rose to the rank of Captain by 1944 and was assigned to the Replacement Depot in New Guinea. From there he became part of the invasion of Corregidor. On February 17, 1945 Captain Frank D. Centanni, 1st Platoon, 34th Infantry, led his troops up Malasla Hill where he was struck down. Frank was one of 70 Cleveland fire fighters to serve on active duty during the war and the only member to not return to duty. He is buried in the American Military Cemetery in Manila also known as Fort William McKinley.

CFD members donated ten cents each to fabricate a plaque in his

memory that was mounted at Station 28. When the Fire Museum took over building, the plaque was not found. Two years ago a serious effort began to learn what happened to the plaque and more about Frank with a story that ran in the Bugle. Research efforts began. Member Chuck Muckley found military records and a 1976 Cleveland Press story by Dick Feagler about the plaque being found at the E. 49th Street shops. It was in the trunk of a CFD auto being scrapped. Apparently it wound up there, possibly accidently discarded during a Station 28 renovation to accept Engine 1 and Ladder 1 in the building.

Member Danny Hayden began to make calls to family names in the obit and Centanni names in directories. Fast forward Museum Board Member Kenny Rybka (also a Board member of the Annual Firefighters Memorial Ride) began exploring the possibility of

honoring Frank at the Memorial Ride ceremony before the 2017 Ride. new plaque would be made. After lots of telephone calls, Kenny finally located the last surviving of nine Centanni siblings, brother John in New York City. His daughter Cindy became involved in the conversations and was thrilled to learn about the project. John was physically unable to attend but Cindy

would come to Cleveland. John made a video for Cindy to take along on the visit.

On Sunday May 28, 2017 Kenny presented the story of Frank Centanni to over 800 people gathered for the ride and the ceremony.

Fire Chief Angelo Calvillo offered remarks on behalf of the Fire Department. Cindy was presented with the new plaque honoring Frank. It was decided that it should go back to New York to reside with brother John.

A number of Frank's extended family had been contacted and invited to attend the ceremony. Following the event, they returned to Station 28 for a tour of where Frank served. Through the efforts of many people, the original plaque was located and donated by the Centanni Family with the understanding that it be displayed at the Fire Museum. A suitable site will be determined for its display. Its original location at Station 28 is unknown.

When installed the plaque will be a fitting tribute to FGF Frank D. Centanni, the only Department member to give his life for his country during World War II May he rest in peace and know his sacrifice is recognized by all those who pass by.

# **Firefighters Memorial Ride**

Despite a forecast predicating rain and thunderstorms, participants of the 13th Annual Firefighters Memorial Ride were greeted with sunny skies on Sunday, May 28th. Approximately 800 people took part in the 40 mile ride from the Cleveland Firefighters Memorial, which is located next to First Energy Stadium, to South East Harley-Davidson in Bedford Hts. This year, four Ohio firefighters who died in the line of duty in 2016 were honored:

Timken Steel Corporation Fire Technician/Industrial Firefighter Kenny Ray Jr., age 32.

Austintown Firefighter John R. Fritz, age 48.

Defense Supply Center Columbus Fire and Emergency Services Firefighter Adam Long, age 44.

Wayne Township Volunteer Firefighter Ruben E. Mast, age 43.

The ride also purchased a plaque honoring Cleveland Firefighter Frank D. Centanni, the only member of the CFD to be Killed-In-Action during World War II.

The 14th Annual Ride will take place on Sunday, May 27, 2018 and will end at Rock-n-Roll City Harley-Davidson in Cleveland. More information can be found at www.firefightersmemorialride.com

#### Annual Fire Museum Memorial Muster in Hudson

The Muster this year will be different. It is being held on the Village Green in downtown Hudson (SR-91 and SR-303) rather than at Barlow Farm Park. Date is Sunday, September 10, 2017, with activities beginning at 10:00am. Featured this year will be hand drawn and horse drawn apparatus with some of them pumping from a cistern on the Green. The surrounding streets will be the staging area for display of motorized apparatus. It will be a static display this year and will not include a parade. Members and friends are encouraged to bring their rigs as in the past. General free parking is available in the near-by First and Main area just west of the Village Green. There is also a free parking garage there. Food and beverages will be available from local vendors and restaurants.

The near-by Hudson Fire Museum will be open to visitors during the day. The recently completed Museum is located in the original fire station that was part of the Village Hall. It contains a collection of firematic items and historical displays of Hudson fire fighting activities.

The Muster originally started as a tribute to Bill Varnes and his wife Ida, long time volunteers of the Buff's club and the Museum. Bill was founder of the Western Reserve Fire Buffs Association in 1971 and first president of the Museum organization created in 1993. Bill was an Assistant Chief in Hudson. Now his son Jerry Varnes is

Hudson Fire Chief.

### Fire Museum Opens in October

The Fire Museum will open during Fire Prevention week in early October with an exhibit on the apparatus floor entitled From the Bucket Brigade to the Big Red Machine. It is designed to illustrate

fire fighting history from the days of the first settlers to the first big motorized fire trucks of the 1920's. While it features local history, it is typical of early fire fighting history beginning during America's colonial days. The adjacent fire safety education area will be in operation with interactive fire safety programming. The Museum will be open on a regular basis, Wednesday through Saturday, from 10:00am to 4:00pm. 
### **CFD Trivia**

- Q: When were sliding poles introduced in Cleveland firehouses??
- A: In 1881 at Station No. 6

Records indicate that the first sliding pole used in Cleveland dates to 1881 when an oak pole was installed at Station No. 6. The firehouse on the triangle lot of Lorain, Brainard and Abbey (now the site of the W. 25th St. Rapid Station entrance) was originally built in 1861 as a firehouse for Cleveland Volunteer Torrent Hand Co. No. 10. It originally was Ohio City Hand Engine Co. 2 that became Cleveland No. 10 in 1854 after the merger. It became home to Engine Co. 6 when established on September 17, 1867. The station was expanded in 1872 with a 2-story addition on the south side for a second hose reel and additional living space for company members.

On March 3, 1881 an oak sliding pole was installed from the second floor dormitory to the apparatus floor at Station No. 6. It was colorfully reported in the Cleveland Plain Dealer, "Speed of reaching the apparatus floor from the second floor living quarters was reduced from 16 seconds to 4 seconds in this Darwinian Descent."



There was a problem...splinters! The Fire Department physician treated several members for injuries caused when sliding down the pole. It was replaced by an iron pole. Why an iron pole was chosen has never been found. Maybe because Cleveland was a steel town. Bright shiny brass poles became the norm at many firehouses around the country.

In 1881 sliding poles were added at Station No. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 7. The first fire station sliding pole in the nation is credited to one installed at Chicago Fire Department Station No. 21 in 1878. It was made of 3-in. diameter Georgia pine varnished and coated with paraffin. Maybe Cleveland should have done that to their new pole.

## **Preserving History**


All journals are documented in Excel, cleaned, individually wrapped in an acid-free protective jacket and stored in acid-free cardboard boxes. There are about 3,500 books in the collection with the earliest journal dating to 1872 when Engine Co. 13 was established. Early books were about half the size and thickness of later books and were written only in black ink. In later years all alarms would be recorded in red ink and included routes taken to reach the fire, what work was done at the fire including the number of each length of hose used and then routes taken to return to quarters. That makes some great reading.
